



Pacific Resiliency Fellows Program Description

THE OPPORTUNITY

Our island communities are at the frontline of risk. With limited resources, growing populations, natural disasters, sea-level rise, and other factors, we will be some of the first communities exposed to the stresses and challenges of our changing world. However, by drawing on the richness of our cultures, our history of exploration and innovation, and the promise of our young leaders, island communities are also poised to lead the way forward and provide hope and solutions for the future.

Hawai'i has served as a hub for this movement—convening the 2016 World Conservation Congress and serving as the cultural foundation for Hōkūle'a, the traditional Hawaiian sailing canoe, to circumnavigate the globe sharing the mission of Mālama Honua, to care for our Island Earth. Hawai'i also has a tremendous storehouse of natural resource data and research capacity, and Hawai'i's communities are highly invested and actively engaged in the management of their local resources.

Kupu has spent the last decade providing hands-on training programs to thousands of young adults in Hawai'i—helping them to become stewards of our culture and environment, and to develop a strong connection to the place in which we live through service.

The Pacific Resiliency Fellowship program capitalizes on the experience of Kupu and the resources of Hawai'i to equip the next generation of change-makers; to create a network of Pacific Island leaders; and to collectively learn and grow from our shared, as well as divergent, experiences. To accomplish this, we are seeking individuals with grit, experience, capacity, determination, and a will to affect positive change in their community and in our broader world.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Pacific Resiliency Fellows (PRF) is an international fellowship program that brings together promising young leaders who work on conservation or sustainability initiatives throughout the Pacific region. The goal of the program is to support the development of resilient communities by mentoring young professionals to become strong leaders and empowered social entrepreneurs. The PRF Program will also give a voice to smaller communities and grow the capacity of the next generation of leaders to positively impact Island Earth.

The PRF Program will accomplish this by (1) Creating a working network of individuals addressing issues of resiliency within their communities; (2) Building capacity within young professionals to create a critical mass of environmental and social stewards; and (3) Providing a space for sharing of best practices and lessons learned from different communities throughout the Pacific region.



PRF is best suited to emerging leaders in the early to middle stages of their careers who have shown exceptional aptitude, character, leadership, and sense of stewardship for the earth and their communities. In year one we will connect fellows across the Pacific, including American Samoa, Guam, Hawai'i, Northern Mariana Islands, Palau, and Rapa Nui.

Program Design and Curriculum

Fellows will convene in Hawai'i two times in a 9-month period (for context setting and preparation for impact). Fellows will engage throughout the year with Kupu staff and each other on calls, blogs, and/or video conferences. The curriculum will include:

- Field-based learning
- Leadership training and development
- Action plan development and implementation
- Strategic communication design and practice
- Individualized mentorship
- Peer-to-peer network building

PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

We are seeking emerging leaders in the early to middle stages of their careers with experience in environmental stewardship, conservation, or sustainability and who have shown exceptional aptitude, character, grit, determination, and a will to affect positive change in their community and in our broader world.

Applicants must reside in one of the following Pacific communities:

- American Samoa
- Guam
- Hawai'i
- Northern Mariana Islands
- Palau
- Rapa Nui

PROGRAM COST

The cost to participate in the PRF program is \$2,500. All airfare, lodging, ground transportation, food, and any other activity costs will be covered by the program. *Scholarships may be available for those who are unable to contribute this full amount.*

PROGRAM DATES AND AVAILABILITY

Participants must be available to join for the entirety of both sessions.

- Session 1: July 15-24, 2018
- Session 2: December 2-11, 2018

Participants are welcome to come early or extend their stay at their own cost. Session 1 has been scheduled to align with the 2018 Hawai'i Conservation Conference (July 24-26) and the 2018 National Sustainable Agriculture Education Association Conference (July 27-29), both on the island of O'ahu.



PROGRAM LOCATION

All program activities are currently planned to take place on O‘ahu.
